## Meet the band section

A bumper edition this week, as we hear from the trumpet section!

#### **Trumpet Twitter – introducing Team Trumpet**



The DCB trumpet section are currently nine in number ranging in age from 13 to fifty-something, illustrating the DCB's ethos of being a truly community-led musical organisation.

To get to know some of the personalities in the trumpet section, we thought an insight could be gained by sharing their responses to some of the following questions.....

#### How long have you played with the DCB?

Emma: Just a little over three years now.

Nicola: Since September 2016.

Megan: 9 years.

**George:** Sixteen years of Saturday mornings! I need a hobby.

Andrew: Over 27 years (OMG! Some of our section were not even a twinkle in their parents' eyes when I joined!!).

#### Best thing about playing trumpet?

**Emma:** *I* really enjoy the versatility and different styles you can play.

**Nicola:** The camaraderie between trumpet players (and other brass players in general). I didn't take up trumpet until adulthood, but immediately felt like I'd "found my people".

**Megan:** Versatile instrument - can play many different genres. Also, it's shiny.

**George:** The challenge. Three valves limit trumpeters to eight possible positions to produce the thirty notes that make up 2½ octaves(ish).

Andrew: It's all about the tone, about the tone!

#### And the most difficult?

**Emma:** I struggle the most with double tonguing, no matter how hard I practice it never seems to improve much!

**Nicola:** Everything! It's such a difficult beast to tame. One day you can feel like you're making progress and the very next day you have lumpy air, terrible intonation and can't play any high notes. You never quite know what you're going to get!

Megan: Probably high notes - not my forte.

**Andrew:** *Playing in tune, in time and to the correct dynamic – apart from that it is fairly straightforward?*

#### If you didn't play trumpet what instrument would you like to play?

**Emma:** Probably the French horn - I love the sound and great range – had to stay within the brass section of course!

Nicola: I get quite jealous of the trombone parts sometimes, but I also love the French horn.

**Megan:** maybe French horn - sounds really nice in film and orchestral music. But I already play trumpet, bagpipes and piano so maybe a fourth instrument would be taking it too far!

**George:** Trombone. I'd fit in cos I have no idea what I'm doing.

Andrew: Trombone – those guys always look as if they know what they are doing!

#### Favourite musician?

**Emma:** Tine Thing Helseth and Ole Edvard Antonsen – keeping it trumpet related!

**Nicola:** I love Ole Edvard Antonsen's tone. I could listen to his trumpet playing non-stop! I'm also a big fan of Phil Cobb. Emma and I took a trip to Birmingham to hear him perform a cornet concerto and he was just perfect!

**Megan:** Probably Tine Thing Helseth - I have seen her live and she was amazing. Also it's good to have a female trumpet player to look up to!

George: Chris Botti - with extra cheese.

**Andrew:** Wynton Marsalis – if I was reincarnated I would like to come back as a cool jazz musician like the Dudes in Lincoln Jazz Center.

#### What piece of music are you practicing during lockdown?

**Emma:** I've mostly been working on the Hindemith Trumpet Sonata but I've also spent a lot of time focusing on technical studies – something that usually gets neglected!

**Nicola:** What's this practice that you speak of? I currently feel it would be unfair to subject my neighbours to my trumpet playing when they are locked down and can't escape!

**Megan:** I have bought a Fleetwood Mac piano book so I have been working through that! Been mainly mucking about on trumpet playing old music I played in college....but for Robert's sake I will say I have been practicing scales....

George: Messed around with some minor scales the other day...how desperate is that?

Andrew: I downloaded some sheet music – Bridge over Troubled Waters, Georgia on my Mind. I also rediscovered a book of trumpet exercises by Max Schlossberg that Robert introduced me to over 15 years ago.

#### If you could choose who you would lock down with, who would it be?

**Emma:** I'm happy being in lockdown with my parents and my brother, can't say they aren't getting bored of me yet though!

Nicola: The rest of DCB's Team Trumpet, of course!

Megan: [Editor's note: she is not saying!]

George: happily, my wife!

**Andrew:** I wouldn't mind trumpet virtuoso Tenge Helseth or Alison Balsom in the house to give me a few lessons. My wife might disapprove though?

#### Favourite film and why?

#### Best Holiday?


Emma: Brugge – can't beat Belgian chocolate!

#### Best kept secret in the DCB?


Emma: I find it hard to believe that much remains a secret for long in DCB!

**Emma:** I'm looking forward to seeing my friends and family again and getting back to ensemble playing – particularly DCB of course!


Nicola: Getting cuddles off my nephew and niece. We've been Facetiming, but it isn't quite the same.


**Megan:** Looking forward to being able to take my mind off work by getting out of the house more, seeing family and friends and of course coming back to band.

We hope to organise another quiz over the summer, so keep an eye out for details.



For something further field, head to the **Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History** in Washington DC and take a <u>self-guided, room-by-room tour</u> of select exhibits and areas within the museum. You can also access select collections and research areas at the museum's satellite support and research stations as well as past exhibits no longer on display.



For fan's of Dan Brown's bestselling novel, *The Da Vinci Code*, head to **Rosslyn Chapel** and admire the inside of the chapel during a <u>virtual wander</u>.
